

Child Support

Child support is required under Florida Law, which means that neither parent has the right to waive the other parents' obligation to support their children. The amount of child support that is to be paid by each party is determined by calculating the net monthly income of the parties and then looking to the statute book to determine the amount that each party is to pay. Frequently the calculation of the net monthly income is the most complicated and difficult part of determining child support. Once the base amount is established by the statute; day care costs, medical insurance and potentially private school tuition can also be factors that are calculated into child support obligations as well.
